

Farmington, March 18<sup>th</sup>, 1841

Brother Tappan

We have all arrived safe. By your letter to Mr. Norton, we understand you intend to take Kale & Kinna to New York without bringing them here. Mr. Williams & all think it would be most unfortunate not have Kinna come, as he is the chief stimulator of the others to study. We hope you will come without fail, as soon as the trial's through. I understood that to be your intention when I left you but for fear I misunderstood you, I write you this note. The Africans are all anxious to have Kinna & Kale, but especially Kinna as he is the principal interpreter.
